Main Ideas:

- How did the automobile affect American Society?
- The automobile affect American Society by leading to changes in society. People moved to the suburbs but were less isolated. It caused a decline in mass transportation (railroads, trolleys) and a boom in other industries (oil,rubber,tire).

Cars allowed people greater freedom and easy mobility.

- What factors led to the new consumer society in the united States during the 1920s?
- BIG IDEA: How did the availability of credit change society? -Easy consumer credit enabled debt to be something that people could pay overtime therefore they were buying faster than their incomes would increase.
- Mass advertising (as seen above)- Advertisers
 preyed on consumer's fears and anxieties such as
 jarred nerves due to the hectic pace of modern
 life or insecurities about one's status or weight.

- Charles Lindberghwas the first man to fly solo on a transatlantic flight in 1927, showing possibilities of commercial aviation. First fully successful plane for human passengers was made by the Wright brothers (shown above).
- Open Shop- a work place where employees were not forced to join the union.
- Mass productionlarge scale manufacturing done with machinery which increased supply and reduced costs.
- Assembly Line- Ford's
 assembly line product
 "Tin Lizzie", "Flivver" (as
 shown above)
 demonstrated the
 economic concept of
 elasticity or the
 product and demand
 prices.
- Welfare Capitalism-Industrial workers also had more disposable income partly due to

rising wages and partly because many cooperations introduced this.

- ▶ What Conditions contributed to the tough times farmers faced in the 1920s?
- These tough times were called "quiet depression" in American agriculture. During the war, the government had urged farmers to produce more to meet the great need for food supplies in Europe. Farmers borrowed heavily new land and new machinery to raise more crops. Then after the war European farmers prospered again and had no extra money to spend on American farm products. Farmers in the United States could no longer sell as much of their crops overseas, and prices tumbled.
